

Bro. Tommy gave us some enlightening statistics about the Gen Zs. He mentioned that:

- They are the *largest generation to date*, with approximately 69-70 million children and teens.
- They are the most racially and ethnically diverse generation in American history; about half the number are from communities of color.
- They are motivated by *financial security*.
- One in every four have had suicidal thoughts.
- An estimated 34% of this generation consider themselves religious "Nones"; that is, they have no interest or connection with religion.
- Gen Z is one of the *loneliest* generations.



As we reflect on the facts presented about Gen Z, it might seem frightening or even depressing. However, it can also be an exciting time for the church as we contemplate reaching this generation for God. As Bro. Tommy reminds us, "the darker the night, the brighter the light."

Our eyes are very valuable to us, so we must take good care of them. These actions will benefit them greatly:

- Eat a balanced diet with a variety of fruits, different colored vegetables, and fish high in Omega-3 fatty acids; all of which will provide the required vitamins and minerals for good eye health.
- Protect the eyes using sunglasses that block the exposure to ultraviolet rays from the sunlight.
   Ultraviolet light poses the risk of causing the development of cataracts, macular degeneration and inflammation of the cornea.
- Do regular exercises to help prevent conditions such as diabetes, high blood pressure and high cholesterol which may lead to chronic eye problems that can damage the vision.
- Be careful with digital devices such as cell phones, tablets and computers which emit high energy blue light that can damage the eyes over time. Keep the screens about 20-24 inches from your eyes, take a break to look away from the screen every 20 minutes and blink often. If there is persistent eye strain, speak to the doctor about the use of computer glasses.
- Wash your hands before touching your eyes.
- Remove contacts before showering, swimming, or washing the face, as they can absorb water and introduce infection into the eyes.
- Wear eye protection during tasks that could damage the eyes.
- Quit smoking. Smoking can damage the blood vessels of the eyes.
- Get a thorough eye exam at least every two years to detect any disease process that may be developing.

The eyes are vital for our everyday tasks! Treat them well. ♦

At the Sunday, February 20th business meeting, GCA confirmed 2 more leaders: Brother Kirk Wheeler as a deacon and Brother Raphael Thomas as an elder.

It was reported that the Mission House kitchen upgrade is looking great. Do take a look. The Mission House basement is being worked on too. Three bathrooms are yet to be renovated.

It was noted that the Lord provided more than sufficient funds for GCA through 2021 by the giving of the saints. They gave more compared to the previous years. Carlton Henry, the treasurer, also reported that 2021 was one of our best years regarding the Lord's provision. The saints have been faithful in their monthly giving. Due to the pandemic, the federal government had a plan to help small businesses and organizations. We applied and received \$36,000 as a loan, which was eventually forgiven and converted to a gift. This was not anticipated, but we readily accepted it. Based on the same government program, we were able to receive another \$22,500 gift (Payroll Protection Plan) for a total of \$58,500. Praise the Lord!!!

More projects for 2022 include repairing the driveway at the exit; HVAC upgrade (the old system is antiquated and has been in service since the building was built); and a new church van (our present one is 20 years old and a bit unsafe). The van is critical for the increased youth activity.  $\diamondsuit$

- With 34% being religious "Nones," this is a huge mission field. It was mentioned that one million of these youths are turning away from the church every year. How we engage this generation will make a difference.
- The Gen Zs are great influencers; they
  could reach an audience of millions through
  their digital expertise and their use of social
  media platforms. If we can impact a group
  of Gen Zs for God, this could be the start of
  revival as the Gen Z takes the gospel to
  their fellow Gen Z.
- This generation has shown that for the things they care deeply about, they can make a difference. They are a *global* generation.
- To them, right now the concept of "absolute truth" is offensive; but eventually they will have a *craving* for truth.

In 2019, right after the pandemic started, I was on my usual morning walk when I noticed a gentleman sitting on a bench on Ogontz Avenue. After a few mornings, I noticed he was wearing the same clothes and he had a backpack. I figured he had fallen on hard times, so I started giving him a small monetary gift ever so often. One morning I placed one of those gifts into one of the tracts that I had gotten from the Evangelism Explosion seminar.

He pulled out the tract that I had given to him more than six months ago from his pocket.
