One of the pastors that served as interpreter that night had previously been jailed, but he was undeterred, and did a wonderful job interpreting as passionately as our pastor was speaking.

We tried our best but were affected to some extent by it as well.

They now run the orphanage and school, a ministry for children with special needs in Mysore, that Helen and her husband Ben started many years ago. She was in good health and is praising God for His goodness to her for her 80 years this March. We had an enjoyable afternoon with them all, and she was excited that we were now visiting her in her country. \diamond

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Effectively Managing Stress, Part 1

Stress is the body's response to a demand or pressure triggered by challenging situations. Many different circumstances and life events can cause stress, especially when you are experiencing something that threatens you or you feel you have no control over it. Stress is a natural human response and must be addressed. Common stressors include work pressures, financial concerns, relationship issues, health challenges and major life changes. Everyone at some time or another will face a stressful event.



Here are five strategies that can help you successfully manage stress in your life:

1. Ask God the Almighty to Help You

God has promised to be a present help in troubling times. He will help you; He will be your healer. A good scripture to keep in mind is Isaiah 41:10 [NKJV], "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, Yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand." Maintain constant contact with the Lord and talk to Him daily about your struggles. He has promised to help when you keep a close relationship with Him (John 15:7).

2. Make Self-Care a Priority

Take action to maintain and improve your physical, mental and emotional well-being. Make sure you are getting sufficient sleep, exercise and a balanced, nutritious diet. Nurture your relationships with family and friends. Social support is vital to emotional health.

3. Manage Your Time Well

Organize your tasks, set realistic goals and break them into manageable steps. Schedule time for

spiritual growth, recreation and personal enjoyment as well. This will allow you to recharge, rest and set priorities.

4. Improve your Communication Skills

Effective communication is crucial for managing stress and building strong relationships. Be open and clear about what concerns you. This will help to prevent misunderstandings. Be transparent, honest and empathetic, even when the topics are difficult. Pick the appropriate time to discuss important matters. Address conflicts calmly and constructively. Focus on finding solutions, not placing blame.

5. Maintain Boundaries

Be clear about your expectations and set limits on your time, energy and commitments to avoid being exhausted. Identify what you are comfortable with and what you are willing to do. It is okay to refuse additional work when you feel as if you are stretched thin. When possible, delegate responsibilities to others. You don't have to do everything on your own. These 5 strategies will go a long way in helping you to overcome stress. ∻

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Melvin Floyd Missionary to the Streets

On February 25, 2024, GCA had the honor of highlighting one of our own heroes of the faith, Pastor Melvin Floyd, known as Missionary to the Streets, as we celebrated Black History Month. It was also special to have one of Pastor Floyd's daughters, Esther, present in the service and also his granddaughter, Charity Sawyer, as one of the presenters alongside Marcus Longmore.

Pastor Floyd was born in Philadelphia on February 20, 1935. He grew up in a small neighborhood in North Philly nicknamed "The Jungle." It was home to the 12th and Oxford Street gang; one of the largest and fiercest black youth gangs in the history of Philadelphia. Melvin Floyd joined this gang when he was 11. However, God had greater plans for young Melvin. He met God one afternoon as he listened to a man who made him memorize and recite John 3:16:

"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Since that encounter, Melvin's life was never the same. He joined the church, began working and later got married to Miss Elizabeth Anderson. They had 3 daughters: Mary, Ruth and Esther.

God used Melvin, who had become a Police Officer and a Christian, to connect with past gang members. It is interesting how God uses our past experiences to help those who are going through similar situations. God knew, before time, that this gang member would become a minister to gangs.

It was the centerpiece of Pastor Floyd's over 400 street meetings resulting in more than 18,000 decisions for Christ. Under Neighborhood Crusades, he was also instrumental in founding the Mel Floyd School of Evangelism and offered Marriage and Family Seminars. Oh, what God can do through one person who is obedient to His call!

Pastor Floyd was later recognized locally, nationally, and internationally. He received over 100 awards and honors from honorary degrees to knighthood from the Queen of England. But one of his final awards was received right here at GCA when Dr. Tony Hart presented Melvin Floyd with the B. Sam Hart Pioneering Award.

We give God thanks for the life and work of this great man of God, and we pray that many more will answer the call to reach their neighborhood for Jesus Christ. \diamond

In the winter of 1975, while attending Germantown High School, the Lord used Robin and Lisa, my schoolmates, to continuously invite me to their church. They both said something weird: "We have fun at church!" I did not see the church as a place to have fun. I thought quite the opposite. Every time they extended an invitation, I would try to appease them by saying, "I will come," but I would never commit.

When God drew me, my mother was a single parent of 3 teenagers, sometimes working two jobs to support the family. In my adolescent years, I was sickly. During the winter of 1975, I became very sick. All of a sudden, my body was seized by continuous pain. My mom was frightened and frustrated. Going back and forth to the emergency room was beginning to take its toll on her. While waiting for a bus in the evening to take me back to the emergency room. I remember she said. "Valerie, the boys and I may have to get along without you." After she said that, I remember looking up into the dark sky and saying, "God help me." One day, while at home in pain, I said to God, "If you will take away the pain, I will go to church." Going to church for me meant attending the Catholic Church two blocks from where I lived. When

I awoke the next day, my body was pain-free. I heard His voice say, "You said if I take away the pain, you will go to church." I immediately got dressed for church and, at the same time, answered all my mother's questions.

Things got strange as I was walking to church. I walked past the Catholic Church to the end of the next block. I crossed a street and went under a bridge; as I cleared the bridge, I saw a church at the top of a steep hill. I said to myself, "I'm going to that church." After entering the church, imagine my surprise when I saw Robin and Lisa sitting in the pews. God had guided me to the church they had been inviting me to. After hearing the Word of God, I wanted to accept Jesus as my Lord and Savior, but a part of me was resisting. God had to help me yet again; He said gently, get up, put your head down, rush to the altar, and get on your knees. I did just that, and I gave my life to the Lord.

At the Mount Vernon Baptist Church, I learned that if you want to know God, you must pray, read His Word, and obey. When I went home and attempted to pray, I said, "God, I never knew my father, but if you would be my father, I would truly appreciate it." Oh, silly me, He was already my Father before I prayed that prayer. An awesome Father is He! As I write this testimony, I hear the song "He's Been Faithful" by the Brooklyn Tabernacle Choir. **He also saved my whole household; my brothers and my mother!** God is faithful. ∻

"Did He <u>or Did</u> He <u>Not</u>?" Did Jesus promise to be with His disciples to the end of the age? We cannot pretend that there were no moments of scare, fear, doubt, and anxiety. We cannot act as if we are superhuman. Even before we embarked on the trip to India, there were times of anxiety and moments of doubt and fear. But the Lord overpowered our anxieties and helped us to **exchange fear for Faith and doubt for Trust**. Even family and friends were open about their feelings and some of us could see it on their faces. But all this worked to galvanize an army of prayer warriors, for which we are extremely thankful.

Chennai is about an hour's flight from Bangalore. Chennai's population is estimated to be 12 million in 2024, up from 11.78 million in 2023. We were in Chennai for three intensive days of ministry and were blessed and ministered to. We ministered to a group of wonderful saints who gathered several times each day during our time in Chennai. We met at the home of a young servant of God named Moses and his family who had planted the Church in their hometown in Chennai. We met downstairs for meetings and fellowship and upstairs for meals. Moses and his family lived on the second level. We remember the delicious meals on fresh green banana leaves. I personally experienced it as if he gave special attention to me as he made sure I enjoyed the rice on the banana leaves. This was the experience of their hospitality to each of us.



In the conference, we had three sessions each day. It was here, on Saturday, that God showed up with a "ram in the bush!" This is a miracle the two couples will not forget. We had an extremely busy day. After three sessions, we traveled a good distance to the Bay of Bengal and returned very tired. On our last night, we decided to take a break from the spicy food and our American appetite for pizza got the best of us! Time came to pay for our meal. Neither of the two elders had any Indian rupees. The place would not accept any of our credit cards. We made every effort to get in touch with our host couple, Brother George and Sister Ruth, but to no avail. We had even thought the unimaginable--that one of the elders would go to an ATM in the night with strangers whose language we could not understand. There was only one option: we would start cleaning the floors and wash the dishes. Out of nowhere, a young man walked in with his girlfriend. He overheard the trauma of distressed Americans who were ready to wash dishes. He said, "Let me pay for them and I will take dollars." We realized the Lord had sent an angel to rescue us. We would have been locked up abroad! The Lord never abandons His own. Praise the Lord! Lesson learned when you go on a mission next time, stay with your host family. It was when we separated from Brother George and Sister Ruth that we got into trouble. \diamond
