


Pre-Mother's Day Breakfast

I also remembered the words that I heard that He would show me the way I should go. I knew that when I left the convent in Kentucky that I would never try again and although I was sad, I had peace about it. I trusted the Lord and doors opened for me.

I trained with another dog, got an apartment, got a job, and even found a Catholic church and a protestant church right across the street from each other. Every Sunday I would go to the ten o'clock Mass and then run over to the eleven o'clock service in the Evangelical Free Church.

I knew I could not do that forever, but I knew that if I trusted the Lord I would know when the time was right to do what I had to do. Finally, I went to the protestant church. No wonder the Lord gave me peace when I left Kentucky. He already knew I would be coming up against another major decision that I never would have made under my own steam. I stayed in that church for many years hearing about salvation and studying the Bible and growing with the preaching of the Word.

I moved to Philadelphia in the late seventies and again the hand of God was leading me to where I should be. I ran into an old friend I had not seen for many years. Well, we were married April 11, 1987. Now, we both share the Word of God together here in Grace Christian Assembly and I thank God for it all, every bit of it.

I leave you with Proverbs 3:5, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and He shall direct thy paths." ♦



Dental Infection

infection. This infection begins in the innermost part of the tooth called the tooth pulp. It can spread to the surrounding tissues such as the jaw, neck, and the bloodstream in severe cases.

There are several causes such as poor oral hygiene; cavities; gum disease; cracked or damaged teeth; failed dental work; leaky fillings; or a failed root canal. Infection can start small then progress rapidly.



You may experience severe toothache; swelling of the face, cheek, or jaw; fever; bad breath; and sensitivity to heat or cold. There are several ways to prevent or reduce your risk of dental infection:

- . Brush and floss your teeth twice daily.
- Visit the dentist at least every six months.
- Limit acidic and sweet foods which can cause tooth decay.
- Don't ignore dental pain, sensitivity, or decay. Prompt treatment will prevent infection.

A dental infection will not go away on its own. It must be treated in the following ways:

- Antibiotics will control the infection.
- > The abscess may need to be drained to relieve the pain.
- Root canal where the infected pulp is cleaned and sealed.
- Tooth extraction if the tooth is severely damaged.
- ➤ If ignored, dental infection can become a BIG problem. Be wise and seek prompt attention. ❖

I am so grateful for the experience that I have been given and thankful to the Lord for bringing me to Jamaica. I have seen God work within me for these kids and I enjoyed every minute of it. Good morning, church family and guests,

I want to begin by thanking the Anniversary Committee for selecting me to give this charge to the graduates. Congratulations to my fellow graduates, and whether you have completed high school, college, or an advanced degree, you have put in many years of hard work to arrive at this moment. Graduation is a time to celebrate our accomplishments, but it also comes with the question "So, what's next?" You are feeling tired, not just from finals, but from the weight of expectations. If you are feeling pressure to have the next steps figured out. I want to encourage you with scripture. Isaiah 40:29-31 states, "He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength" (NIV). I would like to share three truths with you all that we as graduates can carry into the next chapter of our lives. With our diplomas and degrees in hand, it's easy to feel like we should be motivated and ready to move onto the next chapter in life.

However, as students, we are often tired after years of reading, taking exams, and studying. This verse reminds us that we do not need to have endless strength because God gives us strength. Verse 29 states, "He gives strength to the weary

and increases the power of the weak". To give an example from scripture, in 1st Kings chapter 19, Jezebel threatens Elijah's life. Elijah was exhausted, alone, and ready to quit his ministry. God did not abandon Elijah but instead revealed Himself to His weary prophet and restored his strength. How many of us graduates have been told, "You're too young to be tired." The Bible says, "Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall." This verse speaks directly to the youth and explains that even those who are young and physically strong can eventually become exhausted.

Graduation can make it seem like we are supposed to be full of direction now that we have earned our degrees. Despite this fact, the Bible tells us that even the strongest people get tired, and it is not a sign of failure to feel overwhelmed. God does not shame those who are weary, instead He strengthens them. The final verse ends with a promise, "But those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength." To hope in the Lord means to trust God with your education, your career, and your future. Those who trust in God will not stay stuck in exhaustion or discouragement but find a renewed strength. We can turn to God by spending time in prayer and reading His word. My fellow graduates, as we progress to the next steps of our lives, whether it be a career, furthering our education, or pursuing full time ministry, it is important to depend on God alone, not our own strength. Isaiah 40:31 promises, "They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary; they will walk and not be faint". Graduates, as we move on towards our future with God's help we can soar with confidence. Not because of our resumes or our GPAs, but with strength only God can provide. Congratulations. graduates. Jersey City, New Jersey was my home. My dad was a truck driver, and mom took care of a family of four. At the age of four I went to a Catholic school. My parents would pick me up from school on Friday and bring me back on Sunday. Looking back, I know that was hard for them to do but it was all in God's plan for my life. I met some wonderful people and am still friends with them.

Through the years I learned braille, mobility, table etiquette and all the subjects I needed to know before entering high school. That was a whole new adventure because a few of us went to an all-girls academy which was not a school for the blind. We were in large classes where everybody could see except us. Our brailing and typing skills came in handy because when we went back to the boarding school at night, volunteers would read what we had to do for homework and we would type out the answers to hand them in to the teachers, since none of them knew braille. I graduated high school, went home to my family where there were now also foster children and I ended up helping them and my younger siblings with their homework.

During these years, I realized there was something about praying that made me feel close to

God, so I took every opportunity to take part in the prayer services in the chapel at the academy. One of the teachers told me she was happy teaching, but she was happier serving God. I was impressed with that and hoped I could feel the same way.

After graduation I got my first job. I volunteered in the church and eventually went for training and got my first guide dog, Josey. I still wanted to serve God better and I felt the calling to become a nun. I did some research, sought counsel from the priest, and eventually joined a semi-cloistered community in Devon, Pa. I loved it.

Three years later, my health declined so they sent me home. I was devastated, confused, and even asked God what I could do for Him to make it better. A voice said, "It's not what you can do for Me, it's what I can do for you." I did not know what to do with all that so I found another convent, an active order in Kentucky and stayed for about two years but began to see that this might not be the life for me.
